on civil rights and aid to mi-norities and the poor. "We already know those pol-icies," he said. "We already contend that those policies are having a devastating effect on the lives of poor and black Americans."

In his rejection of the \$6,500 annual welfare payment pro-posal, Mr. Nixon noted that his own program for welfare re-form, yet to be approved by Congress, "combines a more realistic payment level with fiscal responsibility." Mr. Hawkins said today that the \$6,500 figure had been es-tablished by the Bureau of La-bor Statistics as the minimum necessary to provide a standard of health and decency for a family of four. He added that the caucus members believed the caucus members believed that, "if we end at once the war in Vietnam, we can reach a plateau of \$6,500 in a matter of just a few years."
