Law Job for Calley Prosecutor

Aubrey M. Daniel 3d, the Army prosecutor of Lieut. William L. Calley Jr. who criticized President Nixon for having injected himself into the case, will join the Wash-ington law firm of Edward Bennett Williams this sum-

who was separated from the
Army as a captain on April
28, was on vacation and
would start work on Aug. 1.

Mr. Mit-chell, who managed President Nixon's campaign in 1968, is widely believed in Washing-ton to be preparing to resign to manage Mr. Nixon's reelection campaign next year.
