**Kissinger to Visit Saigon  
On 10-Day Overseas Tour**

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP) —Henry A. Kissinger, President Nixon's national security affairs adviser, will leave tomorrow on a 10-day fact-finding mission that will take him to South Vietnam and other Far Eastern countries and then to Paris, the White House said today.

On the trip, Mr. Kissinger will meet with United States representatives and foreign officials. When he returns around July 12, he will report directly to Mr. Nixon and Secretary of State William P. Rogers at the Western White House in California.

Saigon is listed as the first stop. Mr. Kissinger will also visit Thailand, India and Pakistan. On the way home he will stop in Paris to consult with Ambassador David K. E. Bruce, the chief United States negotiator at the peace talks on Vietnam.

**Foreign.** The White House announced that President Nixon was sending Henry A. Kissinger, his adviser for national security affairs, on a fact-finding mission to South Vietnam from July 2 to 5. Mr. Kissinger will then go to Paris to consult with Ambassador David K. E. Bruce. On his way to Paris, Mr. Kissinger also will confer with officials in Thailand, India and Pakistan.

**Activities.** The President issued a statement on drugs and addressed the Federal Bureau of Investigation Academy graduating class. The President also met with the National Security Council.
