Declaring that "Vice President Spiro Agnew has won unprecedented praise from millions of Ameri-cans for his courageous, uncomprising positions," a group of conservatives has started a campaign to in-sure that he is on the 1972 GOP ticket, it was learned yesterday.

A group calling itself "Americans for Agnew" and headed by Lee Edwards, a Washington public affairs consultant. sent telegrams last week to an undisclosed number of persons throughout the nation.

"You are invited to join the national board of sponsors of Americans for Agnew, a nationwide grassroots organization which will do everything in its power in the next 12 months to ensure that Agnew will be on the ticket in 1972," the telegram said.
