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Kissinger on Second Trip To Peking

White House adviser Henry Kissinger left today on his second trip to Peking — this one a four-day visit to arrange details for President Nixon's trip next year.

Kissinger and at least nine aides are due to reach Peking Wednesday after stops at Travis Air Force Base, Hawaii, Guam and Shanghai.

Kissinger's first trip to Peking last July resulted in the Chinese invitation for Nixon. Kissinger has told reporters that the date for the President's visit will be announced shortly after he returns to Washington Monday, Oct. 25.

The White House has not ruled out the possibility of still a third flight to Peking for Kissinger before Nixon embarks on his historic mission.

Accompanying Kissinger on today's trip are Brig. Gen. James Hughes, military assistant to the President; Dwight Chapin, deputy presidential assistant and White House advance man for the Nixon visit; Brig. Gen. Albert Redman, White House communications officer; Timothy G. Elbourne, of the White House press office; Robert H. Taylor, chief of the White House Secret Service detail; Aldred S. Jenkins, the State Department's director of Communist Asian Affairs, and John H. Holdridge, Winston Lord and Cmdr. Jonathan Howe of the National Security Council staff.
