

Kissinger on Excursion, Perhaps to Great Wall

PEKING, Oct. 22 (Reuters) —Henry A. Kissinger, here to prepare for President Nixon's visit, sped out of Peking today, apparently to look at the Great Wall of China.

Mr. Kissinger and his party had left, the police turned back correspondents at the city limits, continuing the secrecy that has surrounded the activities of the American party.

The tombs of Chinese emperors of the Ming Dynasty also lie in the direction taken by Mr. Kissinger. Both are sites usually seen by visitors to Peking.

Mr. Kissinger is to leave Peking on the weekend, although the time of his departure has not been announced.

After the President's national security adviser and his aides had left, police turned back correspondents at the city boundary and the

customary secrecy was observed about what the American party was doing.

The party returned last night and began more consultations with the Chinese at the Great Hall of the People.

Kissinger and members of his mission also went shopping in Peking last night when the city was quiet.
