

Tanzanian Says Rejoicing at U.N. Wasn't Meant to Shame U.S.

Nov. 5—Tanzania's chief delegate to the United Nations said today that he had "respect and esteem" for President Nixon and that his delegation's joyous reaction to the General Assembly vote on China last week had not been meant to shame the United States.

"Whether we danced or not is very, very trivial," the 29-year-old Ambassador, Salim A. Salim, said in an interview at his office.

He added: "We are extremely happy, but our rejoicing was at the righting of an injustice. At no point in our cheering and applauding did we consider that we were doing so to humiliate the United States."
