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Kissinger Deputy Heads Team Going To Peking Today

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KEY BISCAYNE, Fla., Dec. 28—The White House announced today that a delegation of American officials would leave tomorrow for a week's stay in Peking to arrange details of President Nixon's meeting with Chinese leaders in February.

The delegation will be headed by Brig. Gen. Alexander M. Haig, deputy to the President's national security adviser, Henry A Visionary Henry A. Kissinger, who has made two earlier trips.

The group will include John Scali, Special Assistant for For-eign Affairs; Ronald L. Ziegler, White House press secretary; other White House aides, and representatives of the three ma-jor television networks.

The major purpose of the trip, according to a deputy press secretary, Gerald Warren, is to set up facilities for trans-mission of the news of the President's visit and to discuss security arrangements. Mr. Warren said the inter-ests of "all media would be taken into consideration," even though only television repre-sentatives would make the cur-rent trip. One crucial issue to be dis-

rent trip. One crucial issue to be dis-cussed in Peking will be the size of the press party in Feb-ruary. Mr. Ziegler has been swamped with applications, but the Chinese are reportedly try-ing to keep the delegation as small as possible. small as possible.
