

KISSINGER DISCUSSES TRIP WITH BUCKLEY

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After an hour with Henry A. Kissinger, President Nixon's assistant for national security, Senator James L. Buckley said today that he was still concerned about the effects of Mr. Nixon's trip to China on allies in Asia.

The New York Conservative-Republican said that the meeting had satisfied him that the United States did not intend to repudiate its commitments to aid Asian nations, including the Republic of China on Taiwan. But he said he was still concerned about interpretations abroad of the results of the trip and he reiterated that Mr. Nixon should affirm that the United States "was not backing away from its commitments."

Mr. Buckley, who last week characterized the trip as "a disastrous adventure in American diplomacy," said that his meeting with Mr. Kissinger, arranged at Mr. Kissinger's request, made him "better aware of some of the problems" encountered by the Presidential party in China.

"But this does not affect my concern about the net results of the China excursion," he added, or the need to reassure the Asians "who need reassuring."
