Talks Are to Be Informal During Three-Day Stay

Kissinger, President Nixon's adviser on national se-curity, will fly to Tokyo on April 15 for three days of in-formal discussions with Jap-anese leaders, the White House announced tonight. Meanwhile, there were strong indications that Mr. Nixon would visit Iran, follow-ing his trip to the Soviet Union ing his trip to the Soviet Union scheduled for May. White House officials did not deny a report in The Washing-ton Star this afternoon that planning for such a trip was under way, saying only that no final decisions had been reached about the President's itinerary.

The announcement of Mr. Kissinger'strip, made simul-taneously in Tokyo, said he had accepted a long-standing m-vitation from Yoshizane Iwasa, chairman of the Japanese-Unit States Economic Council and also chairman of Japan's largest bank, Fuji Bank, Ltd. Ronald L. Ziegler, the White House press secretary, said Mr. Kissinger would confer with Premier Eisaku Sato, Foreign Minister Takeo Fukuda and other officials on a wide range

other officials on a wide range of issues, but insisted that the visit was not related to Mr. Nixon's recent trip to China.

Nixon-Sato Talk Recalled

Nixon-Sato Talk Recalled The President's visit to China caused considerable apprehen-sion in Japan and visible ir-ritation among Japanese lead-ers. Mr. Ziegler said that Mr. Nixon's meeting with Mr. Sato in San Clemente, Calif., in Janauary and a visit to Tokyo late in February by Marshall Green, Assistant Secretary of State for East Asia Affairs, had reassured, Japan on the United State's policy toward China. At the same time, however, officials here acknowledged th there was nothing to be lost and perhaps much to be gained by sending Mr. Kissinger to give the Japanese further re-assurances that no secret deals had been made in Peking at their expense. Mr. Ziegler said theKissinger journey should not be inter-preted as a prelude to a visit by the President to Japan later this year. Although Emperor Hirohito had said that he would be pleased if Mr. Nixon paid an official call to Japan, Mr. Ziegler, who spent much of this wear.

Mr. Ziegler, who spent much of this day answering ques-tions and making announce-ments about the real and pur-ported comings and goings of the President and Mr. Kissinger, also denied a report that Mr. Kissinger had conferred with Cuban officials while in Aca-pulco last week for what the White House has described as vacation.

White House has described as vacation. Mr. Ziegler said there was "absolutely no substance" to an article in The Washington Daily News quoting Cuban exile sources as saying that Mr. Kis-singer had conferred with Ha-vanna's Ambassador to Mex-ico, Joaquin Hernandez Armas.
