Reagan's Kind of 'Peace Demo

Governor Ronald Reagan, a strong supporter of President Nixon's decision to resume the bombing of North Vietnam, spelled out guidelines yesterday for what he called a "sensible" peace demonstration.

The governor said demon-

strators should tell the enemy, "You withdraw back of the demilitarized zone, go back to where we were four weeks ago when our men were coming home right on schedule and there was no interference, you do that and we'll say to our President, 'You've got to stop the bombing . . . sit down* and

settle this."

"That would make a sensible demonstration and would have a salubrious effect on the enemy," Reagan said. "I think he'd have to read that."

Reagan, who said last week he believes Nixon publicly should keep the door open to possible use of nuclear weapons, said now "we just have to hurt the enemy to the place where he finds it more advantageous to sit down and talk peace than to continue what he's doing."
