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New UROC Attack On Nixon Sechronicle

The president of the ultra - conservative United Republicans of California accused President Nixon in San Jose yesterday of sacrificing American lives in Vietnam in order to win re - election.

Walter Hintzen of Santa Barbara also charged that United States airmen are merely playing a game because the United States does not want to win the war.

Speaking at a press conference, Hintzen declared that if the nation "really wanted to win the war, we would be bombing North Vietnam ports and its facto-

Hintzen, who is a bitter foe of President Nixon, contends that Mr. Nixon has broken all of his 1968 campaign pledges and has adopted a Democratic Party program which is leading "the nation down the road to socialism."

"UROC members may sit on their hands and not vote for Nixon in November and thus allow the Democrats to win California," Hintzen said. "It would not make any difference in America to have a Democrat in the White House because of the way Nixon has departed from all of his previous political positions."

Hintzen said he hopes the UROC convention now under way here will endorse GOP Presidential candidate John Ashbrook, the conservative Ohio congressman.

Ashbrook, Hintzen said, "represents the same positions politically as did the members of UROC."

Hintzen acknowedged that there may be an effort at the convention by friends of the President to block an endorsement of Ashbrook. Endorsement requires a twothirds vote of all delegates present.

Hintzen claimed that Governor Ronald Reagan, who is chairman of the Nixon delegation, was not invited to address the convention because "he is very persuasive and might influence the action of the delegates." Hintzen also claimed that there is only time for one principal speaker at the convention and that he had chosen Ashbrook to fill this time.

Ashbrook will address the

convention tonight.

Tomorrow, besides endorsing their Presidential candidate, the delegates will adopt a set of policy resolutions and will elect new officers for the coming year.
