9 EX-KISSINGER AIDES DENOUNCE U.S. MOVES

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WASHINGTON, May 11,
(UPI)—Nine former members
of Henry A. Kissinger's staff
denounced the mining of North
Vietnamese harbors today as a
"fruitless and ill-conceived
effort to preserve the President's concept of American
Presidential prestige."

In a letter to Mr. Kissinger,
President Nixon's assistant for
national security, the former
White House aides, who had
served on the National Security
Council staff, urged him to "do
everything possible to extricate
the United States from the perilous and false position in
which it has been placed."

The letter was distributed by
Roger Morris, now an aide to
Senator Walter Mondale, Democrat of Minnesota, after it was
delivered to Mr. Kissinger.

We are appalled that the
councils of common sense
about Vietnam should have
failed once again, that our nation's basic interest in movement toward détente and arms
control should be so jeopardized, and that our Government
should have undertaken a
course of action which even
some of its own analyses have
shown to be dangerous and
probably ineffective," the letter
said.
