President's Big Welcome To Miami

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Arriving in Florida to claim his Republican renomination prize, President Nixon got a noisy airport welcome yesterday from 2000 young supporters.

He pledged to the cheering, chanting, sign - waving crowd that young people will have a larger role in both his campaign and in his second term in the White House.

"You want to participate . . . and you're going to," the President told the airport crowd as he spoke of the "next four years."

Mr. Nixon flew to Miami International Airport five hours before the Republican Convention formally nominated him for a second term.

As he walked with a big smile and wave down the ramp from his presidential

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jet, he was greeted by Mrs. Nixon, daughters Julie Eisenhower and Tricia Cox, and their husbands, David Eisenhower and Edward Cox.

After his ten - minute airport speech, interrupted by chants of "Four more years!" the President worked his way along the fringes of the crowd.

He paused with his wife as the band and chorus played and sang "America." Then he boarded a helicopter to fly to his Key Biscayne home where aides said he would watch last night's convention proceedings on television.

The President is not scheduled to go to Comvention Hall on Miami Beach until tonight when he delivers an acceptance speech expected to set the tone for his next four years in office, if he defeats Democratic nominee George McGovern.

In the moments before his arrival at the airport such celebrities as John Wayne and Ethel Merman appeared before the crowd, which practiced its chants of "Four more years!"

The chief exceutive, looking tanned and relaxed after spending most of the past two weeks at Camp David in

Maryland, joked with the crowd that "I really shouldn't be here," but added: "I think I'm going to be nominated tonight."

He said the welcome brought back memories of his arrival in Miami four years ago. He won the Republican nomination then, he told the crowd, and "we won in November."

This brought another chorus of the chant "Four more years." Mr. Nixon responded, with a smile: "I don't know anyone who has a better idea."

PAT

After Mr. Nixon expressed gratitude for the convention's warm tribute Monday night to Mrs. Nixon, the crowd broke into a chant: "We want Pat! We want Pat!"

"You can't have her — I've got to keep her," a beaming Mr. Nixon responded.

After making reference to the fact that the crowd was dominated by young people, Mr. Nixon said that those who predicted that the Democrats who would win over the young voters "are wrong; we are going to win them."

The speech indicated clearly the Republican strategy of seeking support from the millions of newly enfranchised young voters.
