MYTimes in a Name? For Nixon Committee, Confusion

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WASHINGTON, Sept. 6 -Senator George McGovern's campaign staff, embarrassed by recent reports of organizational confusion in its ranks, can take some solace from a bit of bureaucratic

from a bit of bureaucratic befuddlement in President's Nixon's campaign. It's not that the hundreds of people working for the President's re-election aren't certain of what they're doing; it's only that some of them aren't agreed on what they should be called. When originally formed last year, Mr. Nixon's campaign apparatus was christened the Committee for the Re-election the President.

That's how the stationery

reads and how the operator at the committee's main

switchboard answers the telephone.

Last week, however, the committee's press office, which answers the phone with an enthusiastic "Re-elect the President" reminiscent of a college cheer, began telling callers that the organization's name had officially been changed to the Committee to Re-elect President Nixon.

The announcement prompt-ed speculation that Mr. Nixon's political advisers had decided, in view of recent bublic opinion polls favoring their candidate, that remind-ing the voters of who the President was would prob-ably not diminish his chances for re-election

for re-election. Asked today whether that had been a motive for the change, DeVan L. Shumway,

press staff were assuring callers that the name had been changed. Told of Mr. Shumway's denials, one staff member, Margo Dunaway, excused herself to "call upstairs to check."

the committee's director of nublic affairs replied, "We

the committee's director of public affairs replied, "We haven't made any change in our name. It's still the Com-mittee for the Re-election of the President." Mr. Shumway explained that Clark MacGregor, Mr. Nixon's campaign manager, "mentioned something about changing the name" in Miami after the Republican conven-tion but that he since changed his mind.

later, sounding almost as con-fused as her caller. "You're right, it hasn't been changed," she said. "It's still the Committee for the Re-election of the President." The matter appeared settled

The matter appeared settled until Mr. Shumway called again. "Officially it's the Commit-

tee for the Re-election of the President, because all our sta-President, because all our sta-tionary is already printed up that way," he said, "but unof-ficially it's the Committee to Re-elect President Nixon, be-cause that's what Clark [MacGregor] calls it in all his speeches." Which name does the com-mittee prefer?

"It has been our earnest desire to change the name of the committee to include the President's name," Mr. Shum-way said way said.
