Nixon's tough drug talk: CIA reports raise doubts

Washington - At a recent narcotics conference,
President Nixon declared dramatically that keeping narcotics
out of the country is "just as important as keeping armed
enemy forces from landing in the United States." The
President then announced sternly that he would cut off aid
to countries whose leaders "protect the activities of those
who contribute to our drug problem."

Predictably, these bold words drew election-year headlines for the President and warm approval from a public alarmed over the drug danger. Yet classified documents in our possession show that the President has refused to cut off aid, despite evidence that certain foreign leaders are protecting the drug smugglers.
