## SENATE CONFIRMS PENTAGON CH JAN 3 0 1973

Vote for Richardson Is 81-1 -Brennan Advances

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 (AP) —The Senate confirmed today President Nixon's nomination of Elliot L. Richardson to be Secretary of Defense.

The vote was 81 to 1, with only Senator James Abourezk, Democrat of South Dakota, voting against the appointment.

Senator Abourezk said he considered Mr. Richardson "very capable" but had voted against him as part of an effort to "retrieve Congressional power that has eroded away to the executive branch."

Mr. Richardson, who has een Secretary of Health, ducation and Welfare, heen. Education Education and Welfare, succeeds Melvin R. Laird as De-fense Secretary. Earlier, the Senate Labor Committee approved without a

dissenting vote the nomination of Peter J. Brennan, leader of the New York State and City Building Trades Unions, to be Secretary of Labor.

This completed Senate com-mittee approval of all of Mr. Nixon's new Cabinet mem-bers. Three of them still have to be acted on by the Senate. Link With Budget

Action on the nomination of Caspar W. Weinberger to suc-ceed Mr. Richardson in the H.E.W. post may be held up by Democratic senators until after they question him further about Mr. Nixon's planned budget cuts in domestic pro-grams affecting that depart-ment.

ment. ment. Senator Mike Mansfield of Montana, the Senate Demo-cratic leader, said Saturday he did not know whether action would be taken this week on

the nominations of Mr. wem-berger and James. T. Lynn, who has been designated to be Secretary of Housing and Urban Development. He said that he hoped to win Senate approval this week of a bill to require President Nixon to submit to the Senate for confirmation the top two officials in the Office of Man-agement and Budget, Roy L. Ash and Frederick Malek. Senator Mansfield disclosed that he had written to all com-mittee chairmen to ask prompt action on measures vetoed by

Mr. Nixon after Congress ad-journed in October, and on other proposals as well.

## **Delay Protested**

Mr. Lynn and Mr. Wein-berger have been assigned dual roles as department heads and Presidential advisers. Any Con-gressional effort to question them on budget cuts might cause the Administration to in-voke the executive privilege to voke the executive privilege to shield them from full consulta-tion with Congress.

Mr. Mansfield said he doubt-ed that the Senate would complete action on the Cabinet by the time it recesses Feb. 8 for a few days for the annual Re-publican Lincoln Day speeches. Republicans have protested the Senate's delay in acting on

the Cabinet appointments, say-ing that it was making it dif-ficult for Government depart-ments to function.

ments to function. President Nixon submitted the Federal budget to Congress today, but Congress will not re-ceive details on funds that have been impounded by Mr. Nixon until Feb. 10. Senate hearings open tomor-row on a bill snonsored by

row on a bill sponsored by Senate Sam J, Ervin Jr., Demo-crat of North Carolina, to curb the impounding practice.
