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This, in effect, repudiated the air force's contention in the dismissal hearings that Fitzgerald had not been fired.

Yesterday, White House press secretary, Ronald L. Ziegler, was asked why Mr. Nixon had dismissed Fitzgerald. He said there was some question about the news conference statement and that he would have to confer with the President.

## TRANSCRIPT

Ziegler later said the President had read the transcript of the news conference and concluded "he was mistaken in regard to Fitzgerald. The President did not have put before him the decision regarding Mr. Fitzgerald."

Ziegler said a search of the records had been made and that no record could be found of the matter being brought to the President's attention.

"He simply mistook him-self," Ziegler said.

This, then, seemed to confirm the impression that the use of executive privilege had been expanded by Seamans because he invoked it not to protect a conversation with the president but with someone else in the administration.

Ziegler contended that use of executive privilege was not improper because it related to "a matter done totally within the executive branch.'

If left unchanged, Mr. Nixon's statement of Wednesday could have wrecked the Air Force's case before the Civil Service Commission.
