A controversy developed during last year's Presidential campaign over whether the grain industry had reaped windfall profits in the trade, whether there had ben gains by inside information and whether Clarence D. Palmby violated Federal law by resigning his post as Assistant Secretary of Agriculture to take a job with Continental Grain Company of New York City.

Mr. Palmby, who led United States-Soviet farm trade talks in Moscow last April, resigned on the eve of a White House announcement that the Russian would buy large quantities of United States grain.
