"And this, I think, is a dangerous philosophy. This campaign against press credibility to dvide the nation from the press, is continuing - and is being

Cronkite said that although he regretted using the term "conspiracy" in a speech a couple of years ago, "I still feel that this is basically what has taken place: A welf-directed ampaign against the press. agreed upon in secret by members of the administration." 4 11 317
