Nixon Invited Back to Russia

A Very Secure Banquet

The Soviet invitation for President Nixon to visit Moscow again next year came during a glittering banquet given by Soviet leader Leonid Brezhnev at the Russian embassy last night.

Guests dined on borsch, sturgeon, beef saute, and a Russian compliment of vodka, wine, champagne and cognac. The President and the Soviet leader sat side by side at the head of the table.

Security was especially tight. In the lobby, Soviet embassy personnel scanned eight television screens which played on car doors and doorways within the building. Outside, police kept spectators hundreds of yards away. There were no incidents.

The President and Mrs. Nixon arrived in a motorcade of black limousines and chatted in the front vestibule while photographers, from a distance, recorded the event. Mrs. Nixon and Mrs. Anatoliy Dobrynin, wife of the Soviet ambassador, chatted amiably. Mrs. Nixon put her arm around Mrs. Dobrynin, squeezed her gently and said, nodding to photographers, "We've got to get the women in here."

They then moved along to the cocktail room which really is a misnomer since Soviets traditionally do not mix their drinks. Wine, vodka, and fruit juices were served.

Dinner was served on special china bearing the Soviet coat of arms. In all, 54 Americans and 22 Russians attended.

Nixons Plan A Fiesta for Brezhnev

President and Mrs. Nixon will host a fiesta style party around their pool in San Clemente tomorrow afternoon for Soviet Communist leader Leonid Brezhnev. A number of Hollywood stars are on the guest list.

The Nixons have invited about 150 Californians, in-

cluding Governor and Mrs. Ronald Reagan, political supporters, cabinet members and friends to the reception.

Among the Hollywood celebrities who will be meeting Brezhnev are Frank Sinatra, Bob Hope, Red Skelton, Cesar Romero and Walter Pidgeon.

There were reports that

Brezhnev may fly to Los Angeles tomorrow or Sunday afternoon to visit the museum there where the collection of French impressionistic paintings from the Hermitage in Leningrad are on display.

As a guest at San Clemente, Brezhnev will stay in the cottage set aside on the palatial estate for Julie and David Eisenhower when

they travel with the Nixons to the West Coast.

Presidential aides said Brezhnev chose to reside on the Nixon estate during his stay.

He and Mr. Nixon will fly to San Clemente this afternoon aboard the presidential plane — Brezhnev's first time on an American jetliner.
