hite House Memo Studied in Appea

A White House memo describing A. Ernest Fitzgerald as deserving "low marks" in loyalty, and saying that he be allowed to "bleed" for awhile is being studied by the Civil Service Commission, which must decide whether to restore the controversial Air Force aide to his job.

Fitzgerald was fired several years ago after he told a Senate subcommittee about miltimillion dollar cost overruns in the C5A aircraft contract.

Fitzgerald claims his firing was to punish him and to warn other potential whistle blowers not to talk out loud about stupid, or criminal fi-nancil blunders by the Pentagon.

The new wrinkle in the CSC case came when the Senate Watergate committee made public a White House memo dated Jan. 20, 1970. The memo was from the White House aide Alaxander P. Butterfield (now administrator of the Fed-Nixon's chief of staff.

In the memo, Butterfield wrote of Fitzgerald:
