The Air Force has complied with a Federal Civil Service Commission ruling yesterday and announced it would not and announced it would not contest the reinstatement of A. Ernest Fitzgerald, the con-troversial civilian cost ana-lyst it fired after he exposed cost overruns on the C5A cargo plane in 1970. "Action is under way to restore him to appropriate po

"Action is under way to restore him to appropriate po-sition with back pay retro-active to Jan. 5, 1970," an Air Force statement said. "I'm ready to go back to work," Mr. Fitzgerald said. "I'm ready to do that tomor-row morning." Dismissed in a so-called

row morning." Dismissed in a so-called "economy move" after he re-vealed to Congress huge cost overruns on construction of the military transport plane, Mr. Fitzgerald fought the Air Force's action with the aid of the American Civil Liber-ties Union. The Civil Service Commission ordered his re-Commission ordered his re-instatement Sept. 18.

With a Civil Service rating of GS-17, paying \$36,000 a year, he is now due, in back pay, some \$125,000, less his earnings since he was dis-
