Names Some Top Aides

Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger announced eight top-level appointments yesterday.

Kissinger named William H. Donaldson, the 42-year-old chairman of Donaldson, Lufkin and Jenrette Inc., a New York investment banking firm, as his under-secretary for security assistance.

Carlyle E. Maw, a partner of the Wall Street law firm of Cravath, Swaine and Moore, is to become legal adviser to Kissinger.

Winston Lord, 36, was named director of planning and coordination. Lord, a former foreign service officer, has been an intimate of Kissinger on the National Security Council, specializing in Chinese affairs.

Kissinger said his new undersecretary for management would be Lewis D. Brown, 53, who is now U.S. ambassador to Jordan. Kissinger said Brown would remain in Amman until the current Middle East conflict calms down.

Nathanile Davis, 48, was appointed director general of the foreign service. Davis is U.S. ambassador to Chile.

George S. Vest, 55, was chosen as Kissinger's special assistant for press relations.

The nominee for the vacant post of assistant secretary of state for East Asian and Pacific affairs is Robert S. Ingersoll, 58, former chairman of the Brog-Warner, Corp..
