President Nixon yesterday made Kenneth R. Cole Jr., the 36-year-old director of the Domestic Council, his chief ad-viser on domestic affairs.

Cole thus succeeds to the position formerly held by John D. Ehrlichman, who re-signed last Apr'l 30 as a result of the Watergate scandal.

Cole will continue as execu-tive director of the Domestic Council, a post Ehrlichman held in Mr. Nixon's first term, but he will be given the new title of assistant to the President for domestic affairs.
