

Harlow Leaves White House

KEY BISCAWAYNE, Fla., April 13—President Nixon's long-time political adviser at the White House, Bryce Harlow, has resigned to return to his job as a Washington representative of Proctor & Gamble Corp.

Harlow, 57, served as Mr. Nixon's liaison with Congress in the President's first term and then returned to Proctor & Gamble. He was called back

into White House service last year.

Harlow's resignation was not unexpected. He has been talking for months about his desire to return to private life.

His departure was confirmed today by aides who accompanied Mr. Nixon here for the weekend.

The President spent the day, a White House spokesman said, reviewing foreign

policy matters and conducting routine business.

He signed 13 bills, including a \$50 million appropriation bill to provide loans for American Indian businessmen. Mr. Nixon also received reports on the tornado damage in Xenia, Ohio, which is now estimated at more than \$570 million.

The President is expected to attend Easter services with his family Sunday in the Miami area.
