President Nixon briefed congressional leaders yes terday on his trip to the Middle East and assured them that he had reached no sestandings with Arab or Israeli leaders.

The President also sought congressional leaders about the nuclear aid promised to Egypt and Israel, deputy White House press secretary Gerald Warren said at a regular news briefing that, country. followed Mr. Nixon's meet-

Warren said questions about the possible misuse of American nuclear aid were discussed "to a very limited degree" during the two-hour meeting at the White House.

He repeated administration assurances that there will be adequate safeguards and consultations with Congress over the nuclear materials that would be given to Egypt and Israel.

Mr. Nixon's assurances on secret agreements and nuclear aid may have been intended, in part at least, to

Mr. Nixon met with the National Security Council yesterday afternoon to discuss plans for his forthcoming summit meeting with Soviet leaders. He is to depart Tuesday for Brussels en route to the Soviet Union.

Warren said in response to a question that there had been no advance agreement on a new Strategic Arms Limitations Treaty. He added that a strategic arms limitations agreement and a "threshhold test ban" agreement would be discussed at the summit meeting.

The threshhold test ban refers to a limitation on the size of underground nuclear blasts at an agreed-upon seismic level.
