# House Unit Bids Burger's Son Quit Post

Wade Burger, the 39-year-old son of Chief Justice Warren E. Burger, received his \$26,671-a-year job in the General Services Administration in violation of merit-system requirements, and he should be removed from it, a House Civil Service subcommittee has concluded. A subcommittee spokesman said yesterday that Mr. Burger had been selected for a job that was actually created for him, and that no consideration had been given to four other applicants with higher seniority and more impressive qualifications. A former real estate salesman, Mr. Burger was given his job, as special assistant to the assistant commissioner for space management in G.S.A., in 1970, shortly after his father was nominated as Chief Justice. The subcommittee's recommendation that Mr. Burger be removed will be forwarded to the Civil Service Commission when the Congress reconvenes, the subcommittee spokesman said. Mr. Burger, although still working at the agency, could not be reached for comment yesterday.
