2 PACTS ON WEAPONS SIGNED BY PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 (Reu-WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 (Reuters) — President Ford today
signed two international agreements barring chemical and biological warfare, including one
originally sponsored by the
United States in 1925.

Mr. Ford signed the Geneva convention that bars chemical or biological warfare and the biological weapons convention, which rules out production or stockpiling of biological weapons.

The Geneva convention, supported by the United States in
1925, failed to win Senate approval then and later remained
stalled until late last year over
a Senate demand that tear gas
and herbicides used in Vietnam
should be included.

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A compromise was reached when Dr. Fred Ikle, director of the United States Arms Control and Disarmament agency, assured Senators that tear gas and herbicides would be used only under stringent limitations.

The United States was the last major power to sign the Geneva convention.

American ratification of the biological weapons convention, will be followed by formal ceremonies in Washington, Moscow and London.
