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## Momentum Was Lacking

Several factors, in the opinfon of Senate leaders, lay be-hind the defeat of the Mc-Govern - Hatfield amendment despite the growing antiwar sentiment in the Senate.

The McGovern-Hatfield forces were never able to generate the were never able to generate the interest and momentum that they achieved last year in the public protests following the invasion of Cambodia. The week-long debate leading up to today's vote was sporadic and dispirited, with frequently only two or three Senators on the floor

Since last year, the President appeared to have eased the Vietnam issue with his policies of troop withdrawals and many Senators obviously were willing to accept the President's assurances that his policies would lead to total withdrawal.

There was also considerable reluctance to impose a Congressional deadline upon the President.
Senator John Stennis, Demo-

crat of Mississippi, who as chairman of the Armed Services

Committee was defending the Administration's case, declared:
"The basic question is, do we really want to relieve the President of his responsibility in the handling of the war?"

## 'Help to Our Enemies'

The amendment, he said, "is an interference with the President of the United States" and "a help to our enemies," although not so intended by its sponsors.

The rejoinder of Senator Hatfield was that Congress has a constitutional responsibility for

constitutional responsibility for the war and the power to bring it to an end.

"We cannot avoid the harsh reality that we, the elected members of this body, share in the responsibility for those who are wounded and who die in this war," he said. "That is what our Constitution intends. We cannot pretend that we can We cannot pretend that we can abdicate this responsibility—that we can call on only the President to bear that heaviest of all burdens."
