He said he also deplored the demonstrations against former President Lyndon B. Johnson and added he is "sure" the Democrats deplore disruptive demonstrations just as much as the Republicans do.

for Republican US Sen. As newsmen pressed Klein John V. Tunney for Republican George Murphy's seat, brushed aside Klein's comment that voters would vote for Republicans to show their support for President Nixon after the violent demonstration in San Jose.

Newsmen at the press con-

porters in San Jose got the impression the President might be taunting the demonstrators when he stood on the hood of a car and extended his arms in a victory greeting.

"I deny any effort to provoke (the demonstrators), Klein answered, saying he also has been faced by heck-lers and it is "far better" to reach those in the back of the room when you do not have to speak over heckling.
