Nixons Wrap Up New York Holiday

New York

President Nixon wound up a nostalgic holiday weekend with his family here yesterday and heard himself called "one of the great peacemakers in history" at a church service.

Mr. Nixon climaxed a trip that began with a visit to his old Wall Street law firm on Friday by attending church services yesterday that were conducted by long-time family friend, Dr. Norman

Vincent Peale.

The President was to return to his mountain top retreat at Camp David, Md., later in the day.

Before attending Marble Collegiate Church, Mr. Nixon met for a second time with special adviser Henry Kissinger, who had returned from the Paris peace talks Saturday night. The two met for an hour Saturday night and an hour yesterday morning. The talks between Kissinger and North Viet-

namese negotiators were recessed Saturday until December 4.

Mr. Nixon, accompanied by his wife Pat, Julie Eisenhower, Tricia and Edward Cox and Charles (Bebe) Rebozo, then went to church.

There were about 1400 persons in the church and the overflow watched on closed circuit color television in another church hall.

In prayer, Dr. Peale said, "Nixon has become one of the great peacemakers in

history" and expressed the hope that he "may evolve indeed a generation of peace."

The Nixons then returned to the hotel, where the President watched the Washington Redskins play the Green Bay Packers in a televised football game. Had he returned directly to Washington, he would have missed the game which was blacked out in the Redskins' home town.
