

Julie Eisenhower Gets Editing Job

Julie Nixon Eisenhower has accepted a full-time position as an assistant editor for Curtis Publishing Co., the White House announced yesterday.

In making the announcement, Helen McCain Smith, secretary to First Lady Pat Nixon, said Mrs. Eisenhower would work out of Washington editing materials for four Curtis magazines for young people — Jack and Jill, Child Life, Children's Playmate and Young World.

She also will assist in plans to revamp the Saturday Evening Post from its present bi-monthly status to monthly issues and will edit children's books and television programs.

She asked for and received the permission of her father, before she accepted the job.

Mrs. Eisenhower said that one of the reasons she took the job was because she felt she must "find a job where people cannot feel I am taking a position of being the daughter of a president.

Mrs. Eisenhower plans to remain in Washington until her husband, David Eisenhower, completes the three-year law course at George Washington University that he began last month: The editorial position amounts to Julie's first real working opportunity. She will be paid \$10,000 a year. A teaching career was cut short when a book cart fell on her foot.
