Hanoi's Official List of Captives

The North Vietnamese government released yesterday the closest thing so far to an official accounting of all American prisoners held captive in their country.

The list, which Senator Edward M. Kennedy (Dem-Mass.) said was given to his representative by North Vietamese diplomats in Paris, contained 368 names of Americans captive, dead or previously released.

U.S. officials said after a fast analysis of the names of 39 still captive prisoners that there was no reason to elieve the list is complete.

Of the remainder, 20 Amerians have died and nine have been released.

"All we have is the word of North Vietnamese officials,' one U.S. official said.

He said there have been other indications and reports at various times that men not on the list handed to Kennedy's emisssary are held captive by Hanoi.

The list was supplied also to a first time such information was given directly to official representatives of the United States Government.

In the past, such lists have been released through anti-war groups in this coun-

try, and the government has refused to accept them as official.

The list, given to Washington lawyer John E. Nolan Jr., who flew to Paris for Kennedy, and to James G. Lowenstein, a staff member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee sent by Chairman J. W. Fulbright (Dem-Ark.), apparently contained no new names.

PACIFIST

Cora Weiss, the America pacifist through whom the earlier lists have been released, said in New York the new list contained the same names as those given to her last summer and in a supplement last November 13.

"The heavy news is that it's final," said Mrs. Weiss, who said she received a copy of the same list given Nolan and Lowenstein.

Kennedy said a letter handed to Nolan included "a line which said that this was the officioal list of the North Vietnamese . . ." But he said he had no way of knowing whether it was accurate and

complete. Pentagon sources said the significance of the new list seemed to lie in its at least

partially official nature. "It shows a definite effort to provide something officially to at least some member of officialdom," a source at the Pentagon close to the POW issue said, "whether to a member of the administration or not."

COMPARE

Mrs. Weiss said the 339 listed as prisoners were the same as those on her earlier here said they were still the ill and wounded e recomparing the lists.

In earlier accounting, the Pentagon has claimed it knew of 378 who were captives ni North Vietnam, byut pacifist sources have long claimed that a number of these were dead.

The Pentagon lists 781 Americans captured or missing in North Vietnam, 541 in South Vietnam and 230 in

Kennedy said Nolan took the list to David K. E. Bruce, chief U. S. negoatiator at the Paris peace talks. The senator said after Nolan read him the list, he called Secretary of State William P. Rogers and the White House.

State Department press officer Robert J. McCloskey said of the 339 listed as prisoners, the families of 331 have received letters from the men. He said the other eight have been identified by other means.

HOPE

McCloskey said the only apparent hope of new information would come if, as reported, the list of dead included the dates of death. Earlierlists of dead carried names only, no details.

Both Kennedy and Fulbright had written North Vietnamese officials last June asking that Hanoi identify the prisoners of war.

Kennedy said his une 23 letter to ton Duc Thang, president of North Vietnam, was the fourth he had written to Hanoi seeking information about the prisoners.

In his letter, Kennedy said he could assure Thang "that your favorable consideration of such modest steps ... would be gratefully wel comed as a measure of respect for the dignity of man and a meaningful contribution toward peace."

At his news conference, Kennedy distributed copies of a telegram signed by Mai Van Bo, head of the North Vietnamese mission in Paris, inviting Kennedy or his authorized representative to meet Bo in Paris before Dec. 23, 1970.
