Mr. Porter charged four weeks ago that mail from only 50 prisoners had been received this year by the prisoners' families, whereas almost all the 339 prisoners that Hanoi acknowledges it holds had written last year, Stephen Ledogar, the American delegation's press spokesman, said no mail from prisoners had been received in the United States in the last month.
