**Communists Agree to Hold
Vietnam Peace Talks Today**

PARIS, March 15 (AP)—The Communist delegations to the Vietnam peace talks agreed today to a proposal by the United States and South Vietnamese negotiators that they meet tomorrow. It will be the first session of the peace talks in three weeks.

The United States refused to meet on Feb. 17 because of an anti-American Vietnam peace assembly being held that week at Versailles. As soon as the peace conference resumed on Feb. 24, the North Vietnamese and Vietcong delegates walked out in protest against American bombing of North Vietnam.

The United States and South Vietnam refused to meet for the next two weeks because of the Communist walkout and "the tone and content of recent official announcements from Hanoi," which were sharply critical of President Nixon.
