U.S. Blocks Viet Peace, China Says

TOKYO — (AP) — China accused the United States today of sabotaging the Paris peace talks and demanded that it accept the Viet Cong's peace proposal.

A Foreign Ministry statement, distributed by Peking's official New China News Agency, said the United States "obstinately insisted upon its truculent terms which virtually demand that the Vietnamese people accept a compromise and surrender."

The statement charged that no progress has been made at the Paris talks because the United States "has not abandoned its stand of carrying on its war of aggression but vainly attempted to gain at the conference table what it cannot get on the battlefield."

The statement supported statements by North Vietnam and the Viet Cong Tuesday and Wednesday demanding that the United States resume the talks.

The Chinese statement said:

"Although the U.S. government has tiresomely boasted about its desire for a negotiated settlement of the Vietnam question, its deeds are totally different from its words.

"Now, the Nixon government has brazenly and unilaterally declared the indefinite suspension of the Paris talks, thus laying bare the falsehood of the so-called readiness of United States to hold 'serious' discussions."

The statement accused the United States of "doing its utmost to prolong and intensify its war of aggression" in Vietnam, and "stepping up its Vietnamization program."
