AISDINGER ID ON WITH TO ATH PEKING VISIT Special to The New York Times WASHINGTON, June 15— Henry A. Kissinger, President Nixon's adviser on national se-curity, left by plane tonight on his fourth journey to Peking. Administration officials re-ported that the diplomatic deadlock in the Vietnam peace negotiations was certain to be a major topic in his discussions with the Chinese leaders. Agreement on the date of the trip, officials said, was reached "some 10 days ago" through special diplomatic channels, presumably the United States and Chinese embassies in Paris. "They agreed on the date be-fore the Chinese accused us Monday of provocations by bombing too close to their bor-der, and they did not rescind the invitation subsequently," a ranking official said. Officials acknowledged that Washington had been informed in advance of the current trip to Hanoi by President Nikolai V. Podgorny of the Soviet Union, but they refused to agree to suggestions that the Kissinger and the Podgorny travels might be part of a con-certed effort to settle the Indo-china war.
