

Vietcong in Paris Again Insist U.S. End Its Support of Thieu

PARIS, Aug. 10 (AP)—The Vietcong delegation to the peace talks insisted today "there is no other way" to end the Vietnam war except for the United States to get out and stop supporting the present Saigon Government.

Mrs. Nguyen Thi Binh, chief negotiator for the Vietcong, stepped up her attacks on the regime of President Nguyen Van Thieu of South Vietnam at today's session, the 154th in the Paris talks. She called it "an administration of repression and terror" that was "set up by the United States to serve as an instrument of 'Vietnamization' of the war."

The United States representative at the talks, William J. Porter, earlier told the Communists that their charges of war crimes by South Vietnam and its allies were "unconvincing propaganda, especially when set beside your record of severity and harshness during your current massive offensive."

"Regarding United States air and naval activities against North Vietnam," Mr. Porter told the Hanoi delegation, "you

are fully aware that you have called down these measures upon yourselves by unleashing your invasion of the South."

Nguyen Minh Vy, deputy North Vietnamese negotiator, asserted that American planes struck dike and dam installations in the North this month. He said that on Aug. 2 United States planes attacked the Diam Dien seawall in Thainghien Province and the Namdan Dam in Nghean Province. On Aug. 3, he said, bombs were dropped on the Camly Dam in Quangbinh Province and on irrigation works in Hatinh Province.

Mr. Vy, substituting for the chief negotiator, Xuan Thuy, who was said to be ill, declared that since April, United States aircraft had made 177 attacks on North Vietnamese dikes and dams, destroying 58 portions of dikes and seven floodgates.

He called for the United States to end its bombing and begin negotiations based on the Vietcong's seven-point peace plan.

The United States has repeatedly said that American planes were not deliberately bombing the dikes.
