

Kissinger-Thieu Talks End

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White House adviser Henry Kissinger ended two days of consultations with South Vietnamese President Nguyen Van Thieu yesterday without dropping a hint about the substance of more than six hours of face-to-face discussions.

In the now honored tradition of such high level South Vietnamese - American meetings, separate communique issued by both sides before Kissinger flew to Japan shed no light even on the atmosphere of the meetings.

The American version, in addition to mentioning a

"general review of all aspects of the situation," said the consultations dealt with "the talks which have taken place in Paris with representatives of the Democratic Republic of Vietnam."

The very bleakness of the official communique only served to stimulate speculation that Kissinger came here to force Thieu to accept concessions hitherto rejected by his government.

But if indeed such was the case — and the favored speculation involved American - North Vietnamese agreement on a cease-fire and transition period — no firm information is expected for several days.
