VIETNAM DEMANDS REPEATED AT PARIS

PARIS, Sept. 7—William J. Porter, the chief United States representative at the Paris peace talks, warned Hanoi once more today against hoping to achieve political ends in Saigon by military means. The Communist side once again took the position that continued American bombing of North Vietnam was proof of American unwillingness to end the war.

Both sides, after reiterating their long-standing conditions for peace in Vietnam, agreed to meet again next Thursday.

The Communists insisted on simultaneous settlement of the political and military issues and the resignation of President Nguyen Van Thieu of South Vietnam. The American side demanded a cease-fire first, followed by release of American prisoners of war and withdrawal of United States forces four months later, then negotiations between the Vietnamese antagonists on a new government.
