

## TWO STOPS ADDED TO KISSINGER TRIP

Will See Heath in London  
and Pompidou in Paris

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WASHINGTON, Sept. 12 — Henry A. Kissinger, President Nixon's adviser on national security, has expanded his overseas tour to include talks

with Government leaders in London and Paris.

Announcing the change this morning, Ronald L. Ziegler, the White House press secretary, refused to say whether Mr. Kissinger would also meet with North Vietnamese negotiators in Paris.

Such a meeting would not surprise State Department officials here. Le Duc Tho, the negotiator who has met with Mr. Kissinger in the past, is in Paris. Mr. Kissinger last conferred with Mr. Tho, a member of North Vietnam's Politburo, on Aug. 10.

Mr. Kissinger, who was in

Moscow today conferring with Soviet leaders, is scheduled to arrive in London tomorrow or Thursday and hold a dinner meeting Thursday evening with Prime Minister Heath and the Foreign Secretary, Sir Alec Douglas Home.

On Friday, he plans to fly to Paris to confer with President Pompidou.

Mr. Ziegler said there was no agenda for Mr. Kissinger's talks with British and French leaders. The press secretary called the visits part of "the ongoing process to consult closely with our European allies" and said Mr. Kissinger would

brief Mr. Heath and Mr. Pompidou on his meetings with Soviet leaders.

Mr. Ziegler said that Mr. Kissinger's talks would also cover "European matters and bilateral subjects," but cautioned against speculation that the discussions would focus on American troop strength in Europe and the planned European security conference.

Mr. Kissinger stopped in Munich, West Germany, on his way to Moscow last weekend to confer with Chancellor Willy Brandt. Accordingly, by the time he reports to President Nixon late Friday or Saturday

morning, he will have conferred with the three major European allies of the United States as well as the Soviet leadership.

### Moscow Talks Continue

MOSCOW, Sept. 12 (AP) — Henry A. Kissinger continued his talks with Kremlin leaders today for the second day, but United States and Soviet officials maintained a tight news blackout.

United States sources said that Mr. Kissinger met at lunch today with Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko and the United States Ambassador, Jacob D. Beam.
