

'Deceitful'**Cong Coalition
Bid Rejected**

PARIS — (UPI) — The United States and South Vietnam today rejected the Vietnamese Communists' latest proposal — a three-segment "national concord" government — calling it a deceitful maneuver and an attempt to seize power.

U.S. negotiator William J. Porter said a Viet Cong position paper published Sept. 11 "is nothing more than an undisguised attempt to put the Viet Cong in power in South Vietnam without an election.

"They can't stand the thought of an election made under international supervision."

Porter's statement was made to newsmen just before today's 159th peace conference session.

The meeting coincided with growing reports that Henry Kissinger, President Nixon's foreign policy adviser, will meet North Vietnamese negotiators during his scheduled visit in Paris tomorrow for talks with President Georges Pompidou.

South Vietnamese negotiator Pham Dang Lam also attacked the plan as containing no new proposals.

Apparently unruffled by the U.S. and Saigon rejection, Madame Nguyen Thi Binh, the Viet Cong chief negotiator, put the plan formally before the conference.

The new version of the VC's July 1 plan calls again for unilateral U.S. military withdrawal, dismissal of South Vietnamese President Nguyen Van Thieu and his replacement by the "three-segment national concord" cabinet composed of the Viet Cong, the Saigon administration with Thieu and politically noncommitted factions.

Madame Binh urged Porter to accept the plan which, she said, "creates favorable conditions for the United States to withdraw in an honorable way and to make possible the safe repatriation of all U.S. servicemen, including those held captive."

Madame Binh and Hanoi's deputy negotiator, Nguyen Minh Vy, cautioned that rejection of the plan means prolongation of the war.

"The path of intensifying the war in North and South Vietnam," the Hanoi official said, "of maintaining the colonialist position in negotiations, can never help the United States to subdue the Vietnamese people, but make the Paris conference remain in a deadlock."

Hanoi chief negotiator Xuan Thuy was absent for the second successive week. His absence strengthened reports that he and Hanoi special adviser Le Duc Tho are preparing for a new secret meeting with Kissinger.
