Viet Exiles Like Cong Peace Plan

WASHINGTON — (AP) —

A South Vietnamese group of political exiles says the latest peace proposal from the Viet Cong would help break the present deadlock and lead to a political settlement in Vietnam if the main parties act in good faith.

Spokesmen for the group said that the South Vietnamese want to see a "decent and effective non-Communist government willing to make peace in Vietnam replace President Nguyen Van Thieu.

The group, calling itself the Movement for National Reconciliation, says it represents non-Communist civilian, military and major religious elements in South Vietnam and has representatives in Washington and Paris working to end the war through a political situation.

The Viet Cong Sept. 9 said it was prepared to accept a provisional government of national concord not dominated either by the Viet Cong or the administration of Thieu. It also called for U.S. withdrawal of troops.
