U.S. Embassy Confrontation

MOSCOW — (AP) — Three liberated American airmen reached Moscow on their way home today from North Vietnam and found themselves in the center of a struggle between American Embassy officials and U.S. peace advocates who escorted the pilots.

The pilots turned down an offer to be flown on a U.S. Air Force medical evacuation plane from Copenhagen. They said they preferred to continue their trip home by commercial plane.

Lt. Mark Gartley and Lt. Norris Charles of the Navy and Maj. Edward Elias of the Air Force arrived on a flight from Peking.

U.S. Charge D'Affairs Adolph Dubs attempted to approach the pilots in the customs area of the airport but was stopped by the escorting delegation of antiwar activists

The activists were attempting to get the men back to the United States before they come under U.S. military jurisdiction again.

Under military law, the men are required to present themselves to the first U.S. official they encounter.

Prof. Richard Falk barred Dubs' way as he approached the mean. Falk told the American promise to escore priots home.

Pilots Huddle

Gartley, Charles and Elias huddled in a corner behind Cora Weiss as Dubs and other embassy officials tried to approach them.

Lt. Gartley told newsmen, "I am tired but in good health. We want to get to New York as soon as possible, and spend a few days with our relatives."

They are expected in New York tomorrow night.

Dubs said the pilots told him in a conference with Soviet and North Vietnamese officials present that they preferred to continue their flight on a commercial plane and that they would be spending the night in a Moscow hotel.
