They are Mrs. Willeas But-ler of San Rafael, mother of two lose 31-year-old Air Force pilot husband has been held since November, 1967, and Mrs. Richard Stratton, Palo Alto, mother of three, whose Navy commander hus-band has been a prisoner since January, 1967.

Both women have been active in seeking better trea-ment and release of the POWs.

In a prepared statem as a preface to the press conference, they said:

"We welcome the returned POWs and rejoice for their families; however, we must emphasize that once again no consideration has been given to our sick and wounded or long term prisoners."

Missir Butler accused the North Vietnamese of playing "a cat and mouse game" by releasing a few prisoners occasionally and she position that it would take the year 2080 to get all the men released at the present rate.

"Constant publicity and highlighting the problem is the only way to get the menout," Mrs. Butler said.

Mrs. Stratton said her husband at one time told other prisoners about to be released to "go ahead and tell what's happening. It will mean more torture, but at least we'll know what we're being tortured for."
