WASHINGTON Sept. 29 The Pentagon's chief specialist on prisoner affairs denied to-day that North Vietnam imposed travel conditions on the release last week of three American pilots.

Dr. Shields denied a report in today's edition of The New York Times that the pilots were delayed in deplaning because of a 25-minute "shouting match" between Dr. Shields and Mrs. Minnie Lee Gartley, the mother of one of the pilots, Lieut. (j.g.) Mark I. Gartley of the Navy, who objected to demands that he travel under military scort to St. Albans Naval Hotsakal in Queens for a medical checkup. Queens for a medical checkup.
