There has been speculation that General Haig's visit indicates some impending new development in efforts to reach a peace settlement. But President Thieu, in a written message sent to the national legislature today, stuck to his previous negotiating positions and it did not appear likely that General Haig had been sent to Saigon to persuade him to change those positions. positions.

Insincerity Charged

President Thieu, in his message, said: "During recent months the Communists have been running back and forth between Hanoi, Paris, and Peking, making frequent contacts with American representatives as if they are only trying to exploit American elections, create divisions between the American people and their Government, between us and the United States."

He said he did not oppose a cease-fire but demanded that in any settlement North Vietnam pay war reparations to South Vietnam.

And he repeated a suggestion he had made several times previously that a conference of all the Southeast Asian coun-tries would be the best frame-work for renewed efforts to end the war.
