

Thieu Again Deplores Hanoi's Coalition Plan

SAIGON, South Vietnam, Oct. 8—President Nguyen Van Thieu has again denounced the Vietnamese Communist's peace proposal for a three-segment coalition Government in the South.

He called the proposal "a wicked design" in a message read over the national radio last night to all Vietnamese of Cambodian origin on the occasion of a religious holiday.

"Our army is winning on all battlefields, and is determined to defeat the Communists," President Thieu said. "I resolutely guarantee the South will not fall into Communist hands. Having despaired of a military victory, however, the Communists have been trying to put forth a wicked design, a political scheme proposing a cease-fire and a three-segment Government. I know you will not be deceived."

The President's office also described as "pure fabrication" a recent United Press International report from Saigon purporting to describe a new allied peace proposal in the works as the result of the visit here last week of Maj. Gen. Alexander M. Haig Jr., deputy to Henry A. Kissinger, President Nixon's adviser on national security.
