## Kosygin Urges More Talks

Premier Aleksei Kosygin of the Soviet Union, expressed the hope yesterday that further Vietnam peace negotiations would be held and would "soon lead to an agreement ending the war."

The Soviet leader made the statement to North Vietnamese and Viet Cong envoys as they presented him with the text of the Hanoi government's statement Thursday accusing the United States of reneging on a cease-fire accord drafted in

recent negotiations in Paris.

According to the official Soviet press agency Tass, Kosygin voiced support for the Hanoi statement, but apparently without specifically endorsing the position that a complete agreement had been drafted with the understanding that it would be signed next Tuesday in Paris by the foreign ministers of the United States and North Vietnam.

Instead, according to Tass, Kosygin expressed the hope "that the talks on a settlement in Vietnam will

be contined," in effect backing the view of the United States that another round of negotiations was needed to arrive at a final accord.

Tass said the Premier assured the Vietnamese diplomats that "the courageous struggle of the Vietnamese people will continue to have the support of the Soviet Union and the entire Soviet people." He also expressed cinfidence that the "right cause" of the Vietnamese people would ultimately triumph.

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
